The high school Visual and Performing Arts programs expose students to a variety of media and performance styles. The arts play an important role in students' education. Enrollment in visual and performing arts courses enhance students' critical thinking abilities and improve their performances in core coursework (Source: Americans for the Arts Action Fund). From Thomas L. Friedman (The World is Flat) to Daniel Pink (A Whole New Mind), experts from different arenas are stressing the importance of a sound visual and performing arts education as the new big educational need for the 21<sup>st</sup> century world. Researcher Dr. Shirley Brice-Hall of Stanford University has shown that a visual arts education accomplishes much more than equipping students with traditional studio skills. A research team exploring the link between music and intelligence reported that music training is far superior to computer instruction in dramatically enhancing children's abstract reasoning skills, the skills necessary for learning math and science.
